**Check Out**- Begins at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday with loading of Steers from Sale of Champions to be leaving before all other animals. All animals must be removed by 6:30 p.m. except for the Swine that leave Monday morning.

### ADDITIONAL RULES OF ENTRY

- Youth enrolled in 4-H, FFA, or other youth groups in a flowers and houseplants project are eligible to participate in this project.
- All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor.
- Houseplants must be grown from seeds or leaf, stem, sectional cuttings; or divisions, since August of the preceding year unless specified differently. Dish gardens and terrariums should be started at least 30 days prior to the date of the fair.
- Plant species and the date started must be written on wooden or plastic plant marker and inserted into the pot in entries in Classes A and B.
- Dish gardens are exhibited in an uncovered dish and terrariums must be in closed containers. A 3 x 5-inch card listing the plants used in the exhibit must be included.
- Exhibitors must provide containers for cut flower entries. The container for cut flower entries is not considered in evaluating the exhibits.
- Leaves are to be left on that portion of cut flowers that extend above the container.
- Bouquets and arrangements may use filler blooms or foliage from other plants but it must be natural material grown or collected by the exhibitor. Purchased natural or artificial materials are not allowed.

- Collection and exhibition of plant specimens of state or federally protected endangered species are not allowed.
